About the Course

This course includes the following topic(s): New Testament: Grades 10-11, Church History: Grades 10-12, Spiritual Formation: Grades 10-11

About Old Testament: Grades 10-12

Read the OT chronologically and study NT epistles. Students use commentaries/guides to understand cultural, historical, and theological contexts. Students also read books on particular topics to help them grow spiritually and study Church History connected to the time period., Read the OT chronologically and study NT epistles. Grade 12 also studies Psalms. Students use commentaries/guides to understand cultural, historical, and theological contexts. Students also read books on particular topics to help them grow spiritually and study Church History connected to the time period.

About New Testament: Grades 10-11

Each year in High School, students read one of the gospels along with several other New Testament epistles. For 2026-2027, they read the gospel of Luke along with 1-2 Timothy, Titus, Philemon, James, 1-2 Peter, 1-3 John, and Jude. Using their study Bibles and other resources, students encounter scripture and seek to understand the cultural, historical, and theological context of their readings in order to more deeply appreciate the richness of the Bible and the humility needed in order to live out God's word today.

About Church History: Grades 10-12

Using a survey of key events in the American church, articles, and extra resources on Christianity across the world in the lesson plans, this course gives students a personal and big picture look at church history during the 19th century. A second text is used to bring the people and events of the early church to life.

About Spiritual Formation: Grades 10-11

Spiritual formation courses cover particular topics in the Christian life to encourage and deepen students' faith. This course focuses on reading, understanding, and following God's Word along with looking at how the things of this world point us to God.



Placement & Combining Tips

New Testament: Grades 10-11

Lessons in one of the gospels are shared across HS grades. The epistles scheduled in Grades 10-11 are a little more thematically challenging than those in Grade 9, but lessons may be combined with Grade 9 or Grade 12 if desired. Students new to reading the Bible for themselves or unused to commentaries or study notes may find the lessons in Grades 7-8 a gentler introduction to these study practices.

Spiritual Formation: Grades 10-11

Can be combined with Grade 12 students. Students new to spiritual formation topics should begin with Spiritual Formation: Grades 7-8 or Bible History in Grade 9.

How To Approach



Recap

Take a moment to recall what you read previously in the same book or topic.



Read

Read the passage assigned or read for the number of minutes allocated. If a book is challenging for you, try stopping to narrate to yourself silently now and then to make sure you are tracking. Or you could listen to an audiobook version of the text and read along. You may also want to read aloud to yourself. If a book is an easy read, enjoy the ride! Keep an eye out for quotes to put in your Commonplace Book or events or characters to put down in your Book of Centuries.



Narrate

Process and integrate your reading by narrating either orally or in writing. Some lesson plans will give you a suggestion of how best to narrate. You might want to set a timer to keep yourself on track, so you stop reading with enough time to narrate.



Connect

Read notes in your Study Bible or commentary. Look up places mentioned in the text in your Bible atlas. Add something to your Book of Centuries or Commonplace Book. Jot down additional reflections and thoughts in your Bible notebook or share with others.



Teacher Note

Read over the lesson plans to familiarize yourself with the content for accountability and interest. If doing the lessons together, use a picture, a map, or an engaging question to rouse students' interest before reading. You may also highlight one or two unfamiliar terms if needed. If in a classroom context, you may choose to leave larger doctrinal conversations for students to have with their parents at home.



Term 1

WEEK 1 30m Old Testament: Grades 7-12 - Lesson 1

Materials: Bible, Old Testament Today, notebook

→ INTRO (FOR GRADES 7-12)

This year you will be reading 2 Samuel, 1 Kings, 1 & 2 Chronicles, selections of Psalms, Proverbs, and Ecclesiastes. You will be reading the passages chronologically, or in the order of the events. "The goal of studying the Bible chronologically is not to replace the time-honored canonical arrangement, but instead to honor time as a setting in which the biblical record appeared. Readers who study the Bible this way will return to their traditional Bibles better equipped to read them. Acquiring a sense of the flow of the Bible's story will put flesh and blood on its message" (from Chronological Guide to the Bible).

1. Your ESV Concise Study Bible (Grades 7-8) or Cultural Backgrounds Study Bible (Grades 9-12) will have maps, articles, and notes to help you along the way. If you have a question about a specific verse, see if there is a note about that verse below the text.
2. Use your Student Bible Atlas or atlas in your Bible to locate places as needed.
3. We will also utilize Old Testament Today and the Bible Project website as a handbook for helping us understand the background information we need to be informed readers. Look up the chapter of the Bible book you are reading in OT Today for any interesting sections you have not read before. Similarly, do a search at the Bible Project Website for the book you are reading and see what interesting articles or videos they have available when you have time in a lesson.

→ VIEW

1. Throughout the year, you will watch short videos of Dr. John Walton, the co-author of OT Today. The videos were created specifically for Alveary students. We hope they help you understand the Bible better.
2. You will be reading selections from the Psalms throughout the year. Watch this video to learn more about the Psalms.

The psalms are difficult to tie to a specific historical context. They are the worship songs of Israel and are intended to apply to the needs of all worshippers across time. Some psalms do have historical superscriptions that make it possible to associate them with specific events, but these make up only about 10% of all the psalms. Another criterion is to place the psalms ascribed to David (or Solomon or Moses) during the life of that person. A second criterion is to place Psalms according to their type (from the Chronological Guide to the Bible).

WEEK 1 30m New Testament: Grades 10-11 - Lesson 1

Materials: Cultural Backgrounds Study Bible, Luke for Everyone, Introducing the NT

Each year in HS, we will be reading one of the Gospels along with our study of the rest of the NT books. This year we will be reading Luke along

with James, Philemon, 1,2 Timothy, Titus, 1,2 Peter, Jude, and 1,2,3 John. It is helpful to be continually reminded of who Jesus is and how he interacted with people. The Gospel accounts were designed to be read many times. There will be insights gained that you would only pick up after multiple readings and by paying attention to repeated words and themes.

We will make use of the Cultural Backgrounds Study Bible notes and maps, Introducing the New Testament (selections), a Luke commentary (selections), and some Bible Project videos to help us understand what Luke and the other authors are saying to their audiences. Then we can think about what new thoughts about God we gain in the process. You do not need to read all the study notes for all the verses. Pick and choose based on which verses you have questions about. Use a digital or physical notebook to record your thoughts as you work your way through the readings.

→ VIEW & NARRATE

Today and over the next few weeks, we will set the stage for reading Luke and the Epistles by gaining some context. Narrate silently in your head or by talking to yourself to go over the main points. Write down a few of them in your journal. If you followed the Alveary 10th-grade plans last year, you may be familiar with this video. The review will be helpful as you will notice new things this time through.

Reading the Bible for a Change

Materials: Reading the Bible for a Change

→ INTRO

If I were to ask how you approach reading the Bible, what would you say? Do you have a color-coded system, dozens of notes written in the margins, and your name proudly stamped in the front of your Bible? Or are the pages of your Bible untouched? Perhaps you write everything down in a notebook? Or perhaps the Bible sits on your shelf and remains untouched. Whatever your answer, I invite you to put aside your pre-conceived notions about Bible reading and listen as Ray Lubeck invites you to a new way of reading the Bible.

→ ANNOTATE

Reading the Bible for a Change is a non-fiction book, which makes it a good candidate for annotation. While you are reading through the text, you may encounter an interesting point or main idea that you want to underline. You could put a question mark next to a statement you find unclear. You may place sticky notes on a page that you want to return to. Experiment with different ways to engage with the information in the book. Some students may record themselves reading or talking about the reading. Others may start a discussion with an acquaintance about the material. Try different ways and see what works for you. You can discuss your findings with your teacher.

→ NARRATE

Take a moment and summarize the main ideas of this section either silently or aloud.

→ WRITE

On page 3, Ray lists a couple of questions that have stayed with him for many years. Choose two of the questions and try to answer them in two paragraphs. You may want to refer back to these questions and your answers from time to time.

→ PONDER

In the prologue of Reading the Bible for a Change, Ray Lubeck tells the story of how someone misused the Bible when he was very little. He also tells the reader about the effects that this misuse had upon him. Think

★ STUDENT/TEACHER NOTE

Instead of reading Luke for some of the lessons, consider watching and listening to Luke via the LUMO Project, which only uses the actual text of Luke but has people acting while it is read. There are many versions and many languages available. You might consider this resource for your modern language studies, too. However, be sure to ask yourself, "What did the film add visually that the Gospel text itself did not explicitly say?" as any visualization project requires interpretive decisions to be made.
